



PREVENTION OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN IN FOCUS

FAMILY VIOLENCE STATS



- Intimate partner violence contributes more to the disease burden than any other risk factor (e.g., tobacco use, high cholesterol or illicit drug use) in Australian women aged 18-44 years.
- Women often experience multiple incidents of violence across their lifetime.
- Partner violence often occurs when women are pregnant.
- Young women (18-24 years) experience significantly higher rates of physical and sexual violence than women in older age groups.
- Women with disabilities in Australia are around two times more likely than women without disabilities to have experienced sexual violence and intimate partner violence.
- 1 in 5 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women aged 15 and over has experienced physical violence in a 12-month period. While the rates of hospitalisation for assault for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people fluctuate, in 2018-2019, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women had 29 times the rate of hospitalisation for non-fatal family violence assaults when compared with non-Indigenous women.
- Migrant and refugee women can be subjected to forms of violence that relate
 to their uncertain citizenship, where perpetrators threaten them with
 deportation or withhold access to passports and can also be subject to
 violence from an extended range of perpetrators, including in-laws and
 siblings.
- On average, more than one woman a week is killed by her intimate partner.

SEXUAL ASSAULT IN GIPPSLAND

GIPPSLAND WOMEN ARE ABOVE THE STATE AVERAGE FOR RAPE, INDECENT SEXUAL ASSAULT AND PHYSICAL VIOLENCE. IN SEVERAL AREAS OF GIPPSLAND, A WOMAN IS 26% MORE LIKELY TO BE RAPED OR SEXUALLY ASSAULTED THAN IF SHE LIVED IN OTHER AREAS OF VICTORIA.

WOMEN IN GIPPSLAND -THE KEY ISSUES

Following the 2022 GWH Regional Roadshow, here is a snapshot of the main issues currently impacting Gippsland women:

- Family violence / men's violence against women
- Lack of access to health services, specialists and practitioners, including maternal services and professionals with an understanding of women's health
- · Long wait times for GPs and specialists
- No mental health support
- No safe houses to escape family violence
- No understanding of how to assist someone living with / how to escape family violence
- · Limited health literacy or knowledge
